



What is a 'bubble'?

Will my child be indoors all day?






A bubble is a small community which will stay together in school. It will usually comprise a teacher and teaching assistant plus a small number of pupils. The size and numbers of bubbles will vary. Where possible we will put siblings together, even if normally they are in different year groups. Children of key workers and vulnerable children will be in their own bubble(s).

People can only transfer after being absent from school for a seven day period. There needs to be a seven day self-isolation period before someone new joins the bubble.

Wherever possible children will work and play outside, in the school playing fields, where there is an even smaller chance of infection. Children will not receive normal lessons.


# When will my child attend school?

### Can parents/carers come into school?





Only one parent/carer should drop off and pick up and they must not come into school. Timings of the school day will change.




What about infection in a bubble?

How will social distancing work?







Only when the time is right will children in different year groups be asked to come back. At that time we will ask parents if they want to send them. If they do, we will try to put together an appropriate number of bubble communities.

If a child shows symptoms, they will be isolated in a designated area until they are collected. If the subsequent test is negative, bubble continues in school. If positive, the whole bubble must self-isolate for 14 days.

Among younger children it is accepted it is not possible to maintain social distancing. As long as we keep bubble communities isolated from others, we are minimising risk as best we can.
