<ul> <li>While exploring the outdoor space, school grounds and during visits, talk about what they have observed.</li> <li>Begin to use some positional language.</li> <li>Enjoy playing with small world models representing different environments.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Draw information from a simple map.</li> <li>Use positional language to describe relative position.</li> <li>Talk about what they have observed in their local environment.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Use aerial photographs and plan perspectives to recognise landmarks and basic human and physical features locally.</li> <li>Use positional language to describe direction and location.</li> <li>Devise a simple map.</li> <li>Begin to use simple fieldwork and observational skills to explore the geography of their school.</li> <li>Use world maps, atlases and globes to identify the United Kingdom and its countries.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Use simple compass directions (North, South, East and West) and locational and directional language [for example, near and far; left and right], to describe the location of features and routes on a map</li> <li>Devise a simple map and use and construct basic symbols in a key</li> <li>Use simple fieldwork and observational skills to study the geography of their school and its grounds and the key human and physical features of its surrounding environment.</li> <li>Use world maps, atlases and globes to identify the United Kingdom and its countries, as well as the countries, continents and oceans studied.</li> </ul>
